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EYES TO SEE

What does it mean to be compassionate? In the Bible, compassion is far more than sympathy. It means to 'feel from your gut' what a sufferer feels. Yet in order to feel with them, we first need to be able to SEE them. It's easy to *know* people are suffering; we *know* things are hard in many countries, including our own. But when we see suffering remotely, or often, it blends into the background and becomes invisible.

In the book of Genesis, Hagar seems invisible. She is a foreign, female slave, who ends up an abandoned and impoverished single parent. One could hardly be more lowly, more unseen; but God sees her. In His compassion, He sends an angel to help her. This book is designed to help us choose to see, and like our God, respond with compassion.

We'll begin these 28 days reflecting on essential elements of compassion and then we'll introduce our partnerships—hearing painful realities alongside stories of transformation and hope. As we take time each day to pray, may God move our hearts a little bit closer to His own heart of compassion.

You have money or you don't...and if you don't, you're poor. Right? Sometimes we describe poverty like this—as if it were a financial line that people are either above or below, making money the obvious solution. It just isn't that simple. From a Christian perspective, poverty is not a line that needs crossing, it is a brokenness that needs mending. This brokenness is in all our relationships—with God, ourselves, others and creation.

In Genesis 3, when Adam and Eve broke relationship with God, fear took the place of trust. Their hearts became scarred with shame. The closeness they had with each other was twisted into blame, and the fruitfulness of creation became a struggle against thorns and thistles. God. Self. Others. Creation. These broken relationships cause poverty in all its forms including injustice, starvation, abuse, despair.

Seeing poverty as just a money problem can cause those of us who are 'above the line' to miss the truth. We too are impoverished. We too have brokenness. Compassion grows out of recognizing our own deep need for God's healing—along with our world.

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Where do you see brokenness in your community in each of the four relationships? Where do you see poverty in yourself?

PRAY

Pray that God would mend the brokenness and poverty *in you* and would use you to mend brokenness *around you*.

A picture is worth a thousand words. Jesus loved using pictures to describe Himself, only He didn't have flashy photography in His day. Instead, He used everyday images. Light. Water. Bread. For many of us, these images don't have the same impact as for their first audience, because they are available on demand through the flick of a switch, a crank of a tap or a jaunt to the corner store.

To get Jesus' point we need to see these images through the lens of the materially poor. Ghandi, the famous Indian activist explained, "There are people in the world so hungry that God cannot appear to them except in the form of bread." That's how Jesus came—identifying with basic needs. Spiritually, Jesus came to restore the broken relationship between humanity and God, but He did not stop there. He fed people. He healed people. He elevated their status. In other words, His gospel is Good News that doesn't stay as news. It produces good deeds. Our compassion must be the same.

Coming up, we will look at how our partners are transforming their communities through sharing the gospel.

With so much brokenness, where do we start? The issues can be overwhelming. How should we invest our compassion? When people invest money they often want to diversify—meaning, a little in this, a little in that... spread the money around. That way, if stocks are down, maybe the real estate market is up. With this kind of investment the goal is financial *stability*.

However, when it comes to investing compassion, we don't want stability. **What we want is significant impact.** That requires a focused approach. Robert Lupton, a community development expert, states that if Christians want to impact their communities they can't invest in every issue—they need to focus. This means going deep in a limited number of areas.

As a church we have chosen to invest our compassion into four places—Haiti, Uganda, Rwanda and Central Alberta. While all the other places in the world matter deeply to God, we feel called to make a significant impact in these four places.

RAY

"God there is so much competing for my attention, my time, my money and my heart. Would You help me to focus on how You want to impact me during these 28 days?"



Every culture has strengths. Some cultures value relationships. Others value industry and hard work. Most cultures, however, also have weaknesses, or blind spots, which lead to cultural brokenness. For example, one culture might normalize gender violence, another isolation and loneliness, or perhaps greed. If we only pay attention to our own context we can miss God's fuller picture of wholeness.

God has placed His image inside all of humanity. When we choose to open our eyes to the strengths in other cultures, we ourselves can grow to better represent Christ in our world. This is why partnership is so important. We partner with agencies around the world and in Central Alberta because we believe that God has given us gifts that can bless them, AND that they have gifts from God that will bless us. We work together–like a body.

Having a partnership mentality helps guard us against arrogance–thinking our culture knows best. In the body of Christ, all the parts work together for the good of the whole body. **Jesus' gospel cuts across cultures.**

"Students drink it. They take it as it is without being purified." These are the words of Paul, the Headmaster at Buikwe Secondary School. In Red Deer, most principals are concerned about grades and teachers' salaries. Paul is concerned about water. Clean water.

Seven years ago, the school began an initiative to address the lack of water. This involved pumping water from the valley, filling tanks, and dispersing it throughout the school compound. The result was plentiful, beautiful flowing water; but was it good to drink? Sadly, the answer is no. This is the reality for 18% of Ugandans. Many have to walk great distances to obtain clean water, and for others, clean water is simply not available. This results in exposure to serious diseases including typhoid and chronic stomach problems.

In Buikwe, however, Headmaster Paul is determined to change this story. His new goal is to obtain a water purification system so that students remain healthy and can study hard. Without partnership and participation alongside this school, improvements like this would not be possible.

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Today, challenge yourself. Drink only water. No coffee. No pop. As you drink water thank God for the gift of clean water.

of water-gathering in Uganda is done by females, making it very difficult to attend school. Pray for those in Uganda who are still without this basic necessity. Pray for IN Uganda's water projects; that they would be fully funded and effectively carried out.



Imagine farming while being blind. Damascene is 43. He has a wife and five children, and for years was living in agonizing poverty due to his blindness. "I thought I was a burden to my family and even to society. I did not believe in myself at all," Damascene said. Then, he heard of World Relief's *Agriculture for Life* training through the church. He joined a farmer field school where they started planting basic crops such as Irish potatoes and wheat. The plants and farming techniques were a success! Damascene made a profit and was able to open a shop.

Once his own family's needs were met, Damascene reached out to others in his community with crippling disabilities. He is now running a savings group for them and is helping them receive training through World Relief so they too can provide for their families. Damascene says without World Relief valuing his life, things would not be as they are today. "I am changed and totally transformed for a better tomorrow." Praise God that He is using Damascene to empower 'the least of these' in his community.

We'll call her "Sarah". Sarah has three kids, and like many single parents in Central Alberta, with the rising costs of living, Sarah is struggling to keep them fed.

When she first found the programs of Hope Mission, a CrossRoads' Compassion partner, she thought it would just be good mentorship for her oldest, Ryan. He needed a role model, and this "seemed like a Godsend." What she didn't expect is that the after-school programs would benefit the whole family. See, Ryan wasn't just going to the program for himself-with two hungry siblings at home, he went with his family in mind. "He brings some home for us," Sarah says, smiling. As Ryan built relationships at Hope Mission, Sarah found out about the community meals they put on. These are a time to gather around the table with others and have fellowship over good food. "My life is still chaotic," she says, honestly, "but [Hope Mission] is always there to help."

Jesus told His followers that when they invited strangers in and fed them, their kindness was directly for Jesus. What a simple way for our partners to share Jesus' love!

Pray for our partners at Hope Mission, that God would give them His heart for each student and family they interact with. Pray that they would have many opportunities to point people to Jesus.



We all experience hardship, but some people seem to have more than their share. A Haitian man's first wife bore them six children. Then she died. He married again. They had another six children, and then that wife died. A third wife; three more children, and another tragic death. Fifteen children with a bereaved father who had no means to provide for them. None of these children went to school a day in their life and by the time Haiti Arise found the family, eight kids had been given away—to anyone who would take them.

Statistically, one of those children likely became a slave. The four oldest and three youngest stayed with their father, but the youngest children were severely malnourished. "They had no smiles and nothing to smile about," said Haiti Arise staff. Their life seemed like a hopeless pit. The social work team discussed with the father and Haiti Arise agreed to help the younger children. A few weeks later, these three kids were heading to their first ever day of school. You should have seen the smiles! God saw these children, and thanks to Haiti Arise, they now have a firm place to stand.

Praise God that He is using World Relief to unite churches in Rwanda and bring about change in these statistics. Pray for wisdom in how World Relief can impact the young population, to bring about cultural change.

Raising a child alone is an incredibly difficult task, no matter who you are or where you live. Now, imagine raising a baby while being impoverished, uneducated and still a child yourself. This is the reality many young women face in Nyamasheke, Rwanda.

This last year, 300 single moms between the ages of 16-20 were invited to receive World Relief training in Savings for Life. This training equips them to invest in farming or small businesses and teaches them how to save. Thirty of these women were chosen to receive livestock as a means of provision. Thirty seems small among 300, but this is an investment strategy. The livestock is an opportunity for these moms to give back to the community. Each mom gives the first offspring of her livestock to another vulnerable teen mom. The impact is moving this community from despair to dignity.

Imagine the joy for these moms to be able to not just provide for themselves, but to help someone else as well! Last year, 15 savings groups were formed from these young moms, offering them and their children community and hope.

Pray that God would enable World Relief to keep expanding ministry to these vulnerable kids. Pray that God would prosper the savings groups for these single mothers.



Who do you turn to when home isn't safe? For years Ella had no answer to this question.

Originally from Syria, Ella endured 15 years of violence at the hands of her husband. After a breach of restraint, she was found unconscious. Death threats against her and her children forced Ella into a shelter where she was introduced to our partner, the Outreach Center. Ella was given a furnished apartment in Julietta's place which protects victims of violence. On arrival, she was quiet and disengaged. Slowly, the staff gained her trust, assisting her and her children through their trauma.

Ella realized the safest place for her was back in her homeland; however, she had no money and her children had no passports. To get them meant legally opposing her husband. Ella was terrified, but the staff not only helped her through the courts, they offered to pay the cost of the passports and airfare. When the team at Julietta's Place saw videos of Ella arriving back home, they felt blessed to have been a part of her journey. We'll never know the end of Ella's story, but our God still sees her.



"The biggest problem growing up today is not actually stress; it's meaninglessness." So says the latest research on adolescence. Youth in Central Alberta are suffering a crisis of meaning. "Every day teenagers buckle under the pressure of trying to figure out who they are and what their identity is," says staff at Youth Unlimited, our partner.

For 13-year-old Scott, living half at his mom's and half at his dad's felt overwhelming. Scott's anger and anxiety made school impossible. There were fights and suspensions. Academics were the last thing on his mind. When Scott had to move in full-time with his mom, however, things only got worse. Money became tight and Scott's embarrassment over being 'poor' was crippling. "I couldn't see any future for myself; how could I get out of this space that I was in?", said Scott. "There was no one in my life to encourage me that I had any potential."

When kids like this come to Youth Unlimited, it takes consistency before they believe they matter to someone and accept the love of Jesus. For Scott, it's making all the difference in the world.

Haiti

When a grandmother approached the Haiti Arise team, begging them to take her baby granddaughter Ruthneie, the team was hesitant. Ruthneie's arms were covered with socks, and the team was unsure of the situation. Investigating further, they discovered that Ruthneie's mother was heavily involved in witchcraft and was ritually burning her.

The Children's Village in Haiti exists to provide children a safe family environment, free from exploitation—whether from child slavery, abuse or neglect. Rather than an orphanage, these children are placed in families where they are cherished and educated. A social worker is involved in overseeing the children's development.

Since Ruthneie's arrival in the village, her body has healed and she is beginning to thrive. Now that she is a part of the Haiti Arise community, Ruthneie will have life-changing opportunities available to her, and most of all, she will know the love of Jesus Christ who compels us to love one another.

I didn't know a husband and wife could make decisions together. I didn't know they could trust each other..." When Ravodige and his wife's relationship began, things were difficult. Ravodige was unfaithful. He says, "I would spend my money on drinking and prostitutes." Their home was filled with fighting and violence. Yet God brought three World Relief church volunteers to his wife's door. They began to teach her about her rights, and about God's way. As she learned, God began working in her heart. "I myself was not an easy person, and so I started changing myself before anyone else," she says.

Ravodige saw the changes and he felt in his heart that he, too, needed to change. They began taking World Relief's Families for Life classes through the church. As they learned, they decided to get married. Ravodige chose to be faithful and began bringing his income home to his wife. They learned how to save money and how to treat their children with kindness.

Ravodige's wife is now on their church council. "We are now helping three families who are in the place we were, because now we know what life can be."

Has God's generosity towards you resulted in you extending that generosity towards others? Why or why not? In what ways has God blessed you? How could you pass on that blessing?

Pray for World Relief volunteers who go door to door to engage with families like this one. Pray that God would help families in conflict to find support in the church and peace in Christ.

Sometimes we can forget we have an enemy, a real enemy who wants to "steal, kill and destroy." (John 10:10.) In Buikwe Uganda, the local church struggles with near constant spiritual attacks.

One church in particular has been under significant spiritual opposition, and to top it all off, their church building was recently destroyed from incessant rains. Generally, Ugandans are open to Christianity, but often do not want to leave behind the old belief in witch doctors. Even in matters of health, witch doctors are frequently consulted before medical doctors. The battle between light and dark, the battle fought in the spiritual realm is real. When our teams go to Uganda, they actually feel the darkness.

However, knowing we have an enemy keeps us diligent to pray. The work in Uganda is "not by our might or by our strength, but by the Spirit of God." Even without a building, the church continues to meet out in the open-their faith unshaken. God will provide.

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For our struggle is not against flesh and blood, but against the...powers of this dark world and against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly realms.

"It was the worst day of my life." Jeff Sinclair recalls the day he was taken to a Haitian prison where he quickly learned how the system works—bribery.

In order to sleep he needed to pay the equivalent of \$100 Canadian. Paying bought him enough space to lay on his left side, sandwiched between all the other men who had also paid. After four hours of sleeping, to change sides, all of the prisoners need to wake up, stand up and move to their right side. No extra room whatsoever. Those who can't pay stand in the latrine area all night. This means standing in raw sewage. "You don't want that," Jeff says. "Your feet become all swollen... it's terrible."

Jeff spent a month and four days in these conditions, but for what crime? The false accusation of stealing a phone. "But God was with me," Jeff smiles. A lawyer from Haiti Arise saw him that first day and fought for justice. Without him, Jeff would still be in that cell.

Jesus came to release captives from physical and spiritual darkness, and He's still doing it today. How incredible that we can join Him in this work!

Haiti's prisons are 4.5 times over capacity. 9 prisoners fill the space where only 2 should be. YNH.

Freeing captives from darkness—both physical and spiritual—is costly work. What might God be asking you to give in order to join in His work?

Pray for the team of lawyers in Haiti. They need wisdom, resources, and for God to open doors so they can fight for people like Jeff.



No one wants to pay school fees, but in Uganda, 68% of students drop out because their parents cannot pay. However, one mom incredibly sent her six boys and six girls to the Buikwe school to receive "an equal education." By this, she meant breaking the norm to educate her daughters too; but it wasn't easy. They sold produce from their garden to pay the fees, which often meant choosing school over full bellies.

Why such sacrifice? Because without education a Ugandan girl only has one option—marriage. Leticia, her second youngest says, "Marriage is where a girl's dreams go to die." Leticia then described watching her neighbor beat his wife with a stick. When she sought justice she was blamed for her failure as a wife. "But," Leticia says with conviction, "we are created in God's image . . . and our God is not limited. I want to use law to defend young girls. To inspire them."

The subsidy the Buikwe school receives through our partnership has breathed life into Leticia's dreams to become a lawyer, and continues to do so for the dreams of many other young girls as well.

What does partnership look like within our own community? Our local relationships developed from us asking our community where the church should focus. They said, "Would you pay attention to the root causes of poverty?" In other words, supporting people before they are caught in challenging and often preventable social issues. This is why we focus on single-parent families and vulnerable youth.

With our local partners however, we can give more than money; we can give of ourselves. This is where we live, where we are called to be the hands and feet of Jesus. So, local partnership also means getting involved. When God opens our eyes to truly see those in need around us, He wants us to be willing vessels of compassion; people who, wherever we work, play or go, we bring compassionate hearts and hands that offer hope. For some, this might look like serving with one of our local partners. For others, it might mean reaching out to the single-parents and vulnerable youth God brings into our path. Money, relationship and involvement are key for local compassion, and all of them need to be covered in prayer.

HINK

What is hardest for you to give of: your money, your heart or your time? Where do you think God wants to challenge you?

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Pray for Hope Mission as they ready a new building. Pray that families would feel peace and welcome there. Pray for Youth Unlimited that the relationships they form with youth and young moms would reflect Christ. Pray for Outreach, that God would use Julietta's place to bring stability, safety and healing in the lives of the women and children who live there this year.

"It is like we are saving people," says Pastor Luke, head of the Technical School at Haiti Arise. "Socially we are saving people; spiritually we are saving people. We cannot change this country without the young people, and unless they love this country." From the outside, Haiti may not seem loveable. Violence. Corruption. Unrest. Starvation. Who could love a country like that?

And yet, love for the country looks like last year's sewing graduates returning to sew this year's 100 grad gowns—saving costs and boosting school pride. Love is seeing the trade school praised in national news, and knowing 90% of graduates find

work in their field. Their education gives them a reason to love Haiti, but it's more than education. Through the lives of their teachers, they experience the saving hope of Christ. "We want them to have Jesus when they leave here."

On Day 3, we talked about the gospel being Good News and good deeds. This partnership is a perfect example, and it's changing the future of Haiti. Speaking to our church, Pastor Luke says, "In Haiti, we believe in prayer; we know that things can go forward." And then, leaning forward he urges, "I would like CrossRoads to pray so that more students can come to study."

Imagine teaching a class of over 100 students, many of whom don't have textbooks. That's enough to make any teacher cringe! In Uganda, however, for many teachers, getting to school is harder than teaching in it.

Harriet is a teacher at our partnership school in Buikwe. "We work from very far; the roads are sometimes muddy and might be completely impassable," she says. This is true in many rural parts of Uganda. Often, due to poor infrastructure, teachers are unable to make it to schools altogether. These challenges significantly hinder rural education.

Our partner in Buikwe dreamed of a better way; with our funding they have now completed both male and female teacher's housing for the secondary school, removing the travel barrier. Harriet says, "We can reach our students in time, and even work with them in the evenings and on weekends." Praise God for such dedicated teachers who want to mentor these students to love the Lord with their heart, soul, mind and strength. God is using our money to impact the future of Uganda through Christ-centered education!

Sometimes Christians don't get along and don't work well together. Sometimes the reputation of Jesus in a community suffers because of this, but not in Nyamasheke Rwanda! Here, local churches understand the words of Jesus when He said. "Your love for one another will prove to the world that you are my disciples." (John 13:35).

Our entire focus in Rwanda is to mobilize local churches to work together to reach the vulnerable. World Relief trains church leaders in strategic programs to meet the community's physical and spiritual needs. For example, in Ernestine's community, someone from the local church knocked on her door to invite her into the savings group she was running. Ernestine says, "I didn't have skills in finance and had no relationships with others. When I joined, I was surprised how the savings group always starts with prayer and sharing of the Word of God." Upon graduating from the program in 2023, Ernestine has been able to start a business and purchase a home to lend out. "I praise God who changed my hard life and [gave me] a better relationship with others."

Once the churches are fully equipped in all the programs, World Relief steps back, allowing local churches to continue being the hands and feet of Christ in their communities. In 2022, we began in a new **Church Empowerment Zone and God is** already using the churches to make a **lasting impact!** It sounds simple; yet here in Red Deer, we have much to learn from our Rwandan brothers and sisters about working together to reach out into our community. This is the gift of partnership; together we become more like Jesus.

These past weeks we've focused on our partners and their needs, and it's clear that without our giving, much of this good work would not be possible. We need to pray; we need to give; but we also need to get. Wait—what are WE supposed to get? Well, just ask Kevin.

On our most recent global compassion trip to Uganda, seeing our partners up close, Kevin received three things: faith, hope and love. Faith—our partners don't have all the 'things' we have—our resources, our toys, our comfort—but, they have great faith in God. Hearing stories of how God is meeting their needs grows our own faith. Hope. Many of their needs remain unmet. Yet, they hope in the Lord's provision for their futures. We grow in hope as we pray for them. And finally, love. Through the joy of the poor in Uganda, Kevin experienced God's love—being poured out on him! It seems backwards.

They don't have enough, yet they give generously of what they have.

Compassion always starts with seeing. For Stephanie, it started when she saw the exhibit for Julietta's Place in CrossRoads' foyer, explaining the need for a secure haven for victims of family violence. Stephanie could hardly believe this was being talked about in a church!

Years earlier, while struggling in an abusive situation herself, her church community at the time didn't know how to walk with her in it. "I had no one to talk to, to confide in." Since coming to CrossRoads, Stephanie began receiving and extending God's grace, and seeing that exhibit made her want to get involved. "The issue that brought me hurt and shame was not something this church shied away from." Since then, Stephanie has been volunteering with our local partners. She says, "It is a part of my healing to be able to give my time to them."

Being compassionate doesn't mean we DO a bunch of good deeds out of obligation; rather, like Stephanie, our compassion should flow out of renewed hearts, causing us to BE people of compassion—ready to respond when Jesus taps us on the shoulder.

What is the difference between doing

acts of compassion and being a person of compassion? Where do you sense God transforming you with compassion?

Pray for our church, that we would become people of compassion for those who are harassed and helpless around us. "
